Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper

Tuesday, March 4, 6-7 pm

Shrove Tuesday is the last day before the season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. This day is also known as Mardi Gras, or Fat Tuesday. Churches traditionally serve pancakes because in days past this dish used up "extravagant" ingredients such as eggs, sugar, and milk. This meal celebration reminds us that the following day we begin a Lenten journey of reflection toward Easter.

Each week we look at the trials and temptations Jesus faced - and that we face still today!

For children: Story-time with Deacon Katie in the Nursery.

Update: Reconciling in Christ Process

Late last year, St. John's entered into a *Reconciling in Christ (RIC)* conversation, which means that we are reflecting on the possibility of taking the step of strengthening our commitment to welcome and value all people with no exceptions by joining a Lutheran organization that maintains a list of congregations which are welcoming to persons in the LGBTQ community.

So far:

- Provided six forum opportunities for discussion on three Sundays, covering topics related to what becoming an RIC congregation means, why we are considering RIC at this time, and conversations about relevant Biblical passages.
 Leaders and members of the congregation also shared personal stories at each forum.
- Provided an opportunity to read and discuss a book about the relevant Biblical passages. The book is UnClobber, by Colby Martin.
- Pastor Shannon has had one-on-one conversations with numerous members and households, over the phone, during home visits, and at the church.

Next:

- The *RIC* task force has met to discuss congregation response to these events, opportunities, and conversations and is now preparing a report for the congregation. The report will focus on 1) lifting up questions and key elements from the conversation thus far, 2) provide more specific detail on how becoming an *RIC* congregation would impact St. John's, and 3) outline next steps. Each member of the team is writing part of the report, which will be integrated into one document. We hope to distribute this report in early March.
- We have scheduled a visit with the author of *UnClobber*, Colby Martin for March 13, 7 pm. If you have read his book, this is an opportunity to discuss it with him and ask questions. We encourage anyone who were planning to read the book but have not gotten around to it to start now and attend the discussion group.

Invitation:

The task force encourages all members who have questions or concerns or who simply want a chance to talk more about this possibility to become a *Reconciling in Christ* congregation to please reach out to a team member. It is personally important to each person on this team that we provide an opportunity to everyone to reflect deeply on this possibility, as part of a group or one-on-one. We would say to all members of the congregation, please be a part of this conversation. The purpose of this process is to discern where we are as a family of faith, and the conversation is incomplete without your voice.

From Pastor Craig

The past few months have been especially chaotic for our country. I have worked hard to stay focused on what is important. I am watching less news these days. It's not that I don't care. I just refuse to be overly distressed. I am expressing my concerns to my congressional representatives. But then I need to focus on the good I can do and the faith that keeps reminding me that God is at work. I have found returning to the Psalms has been calming and reassuring. Psalm 91 is the basis for the modern song "On Eagle's Wings". Listen to verses 7-9:

Be still before the LORD, and wait patiently for him; do not fret over those who prosper in their way, over those who carry out evil devices. ⁸ Refrain from anger and forsake wrath. Do not fret—it leads only to evil. ⁹ For the wicked shall be cut off, but those who wait for the LORD shall inherit the land.

Psalm 46 was one of Martin Luther's favorites. "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in time of trouble." Luther wrote the hymn, "A Mighty Fortress is our God" in response to those words. I'm not wanting to be in denial of the concerns for everyday matters, but I want to keep it in perspective. I believe that ultimately God and good will prevail. I want to do what I can to spread good and gospel. That is not a denial of the evil around us-----I invite you to join me in whatever ways God has gifted you, to be light and grace and peace in a chaotic time. May the scriptures anchor us and help us focus.
